Introduction

The simple rule of Christian life is that we either commit to the duties clearly described in the Scriptures, or we decay like fermenting wine. Jesus very understandably said, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men" (Matthew 4:19 KJV). But on the contrary, most Christians say that we are followers of Christ, but we normally cave when circumstances arise that require us to denounce acts of evil temptations immediately. Like the slow fermenting of wine, we subtly lose our natural flavor of God's image and slip into wretchedness all the more. In order to battle this unsettled condition of ours, we must rouse ourselves. Most of us simply ignore the fact of this fallen condition, continuing about our daily business as a victim who is speared by the devil. And of course, mediocrity becomes the norm, and decay becomes a way of life.

For the spear of Satan injects a poison of slow death in us. To wit, we find ourselves alone a lot of the time. If we were to attend Bible studies or small group discussions concerning biblical precepts, conviction would be at hand. Once again, to rise above the poison of the spear would require action on our part, but we tend to find comfort in mediocrity.

Therefore, many Christians only attend a simple church service once a week in order to keep their status as "victorious" (one who follows and uses the sword of Jesus Christ). True, Jesus went to church (or we should say the synagogue) to listen and to teach the Father's Holy Word. We're good at that part of following Christ; we do follow Jesus to church. We even stay for fellowship after church. Or do we only stay for the cookies and coffee? We're very careful, though, about conversing with certain people in fear that they could ask a question that would bring conviction. This conviction means having to deny Christ again, and we really don't like to deny Christ. We simply want to deny the fact that we may need to make changes in our lives in order to follow Christ beyond church and all the way to Calvary.

After one or two hours of church, we tend to our own business in our own ways and in our own timing. Yes, even for most Christians, life seems to be centered on an individual agenda, even to the point of which church to attend and how often to attend. So does God really fit within all this decision making of what we believe the worldviews are as Christian?

We say a few amens and halleluiahs, and we even go out of our way to feed the hungry or to give a blanket to someone in need. Of course, although we only perform these good works at our convenience, we feel good about doing them because we know they are godly, and we even believe that we deserve a feather in our cap because of our extraordinary performance. With a

subtle smile, we will strut like a rooster for all to see the great things we have done. Where does God fit into this exhibition? Well, He doesn't; we only think He does. Beguiled, we have become victims of the spear who believe that a few good works on our part will override any inconvenience of having to adjust our lives of serving self into lives of serving God.

We would fight anyone who would argue our claims of following Christ, for we call ourselves Christians. But on the contrary, we do our Christian duties mostly out of self-serving interests, according to our way, and in our time, and we choose who receives these good deeds. Yes, like a slowly fermenting wine, subtly our duties bring decay when they are our ideas, our time, and our choice. God has never fit into man's agendas, and He never will. If God is to be for us, we must be for Him and against ourselves.

"As it is written: 'For your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered" (Romans 8:36). For most, we only brush over these words without really understanding them. To be slaughtered means to be put to death like a sheep, or a steer taken to market. The only difference between us and those animals (and herein lies the rub) is that we can choose to be slaughtered of our own fallen conditions or not to be, each and every moment of each and every day. How many proclaiming Christians are like sheep being slaughtered all day long because they are not using the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God? And we wonder why so many prayers don't get answered!

Truly, God does not fit into our apparently righteous lives. But God does give us the means to fit into His

righteous holiness. We must become slaughtered, and we must allow God to mold our lives according to His Word, kingdom, timing, and His mastery.

We must be like a lump of clay, not in our hands and for our will, but rather in God's hands and for His will. "O LORD, you are our Father. We are the clay, you are the potter; we are all the work of your hand" (Isaiah 64:8). Unfortunately, few Christians can truly apply this Scripture. So what are we to do when we know that God does not fit into our lives? We must become broken pots of self-serving ideas and send our cunning ways to slaughter all day long.

Jesus spoke the words of our eternal security when He said, "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 5:3). We must come to the point of actually looking into our hearts' interests, and then we must realize that we are as filthy rags on our own, even with many good intentions. God has a plan for each and every one of us. But when we are in His way, because of the poison of self-interest, He will not carry out that plan. The whole matter really does come down to the question of what is most valuable to us: serving self or serving God? And on this decision we will one day be judged. What is most appalling is that we do know the large difference between our own ingenious ways compared to the Holy ways of the Lord.

Will we become poor in sprit? Well, that decision depends on how special we think our ways are. And that one factor determines whether ours is the kingdom of heaven or not. Duty to our own nature will always bring decay to the image of God, in which we have been created to live and abide. In other words, with the

things we do, do we salute the sword of God for His glory, or do we salute the spear of the devil?

The subtlety of our duties is such a detriment to our well being. We run with exuberance towards the appealing offers that Satan presents, but after we partake of them, the stench of our spirits rotting away leaves us hanging in the balance once again, only to self-serve another day. Searching for new and improved ways to feel good, slowly but surely we continue with self at the forefront, even though God's Word always wins

"Anyone who does not take up his cross and follow me is not worthy of me. Whoever finds his life will lose it and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it" (Matthew 10:38-39). You are about to embark on a series of events that takes place in every person's life that is born of a woman. As much as some would like to deny the fact, rich or poor, famous or ordinary, a politician or a voter, all of mankind has been, is presently, or will again be in that all-too-familiar boat with winds and waves raging on all sides. You know the boat, and you know the feeling, the one that will not let you rest in the day or sleep during the night, the feeling of much anxiety, heartache, and sorrow. The attrition certainly should cause us to pause and ask whether we are in the right boat.

Where does God fit in that boat? He doesn't, not in that boat! Jesus sees the boat, and He comes to those who are in it. That night long ago when the disciples found themselves in the midst of a great storm, Christ was not in the boat; He was on the sea when one brave soul cried to Him, "Lord, if it's you...tell me to come to you on the water" (Matthew14:28).

And even then, as Peter did, we begin to doubt and fear the unknown, many times sinking and even retreating back to that familiar boat with our familiar friends. You remember the story of a young lad named David, who boldly said, "The LORD who delivered me from the paw of the lion and the paw of the bear will deliver me from the hand of this Philistine" (1 Samuel 17:37). Willingness and faith in the living God is what will defeat the torrents of this world and bring hope for a better tomorrow to everyone. Where does God fit in this attitude? He fits into every area in which we choose to depend and rely on Him. Outside of that reliance, we will continue to exhibit only subtle decay from the spear of Satan. "All man's efforts are for his mouth, yet his appetite is never satisfied" (Ecclesiastes 6:7).

Chapter One

The dry land is a place where those traveling to destinations that they visit over and over again heap lots of luggage upon their racks. Most of us are not able to find a place of rest for even a moment. We feel as though our roots

from previous occasions keep our minds and hearts contained only to the lifestyles of the past. Oh, this journey has happened before, you remember, when the Israelites rebelled with stiff necks after God delivered them out of the land of Egypt. "But as for you, turn around and set out toward the desert along the route to the Red Sea" (Deuteronomy 1:40).

Yes, they had to carry that entire luggage on the rack of their backs once again to a place where they had already been. Does their journey sound familiar? Of course it does, because we are a rebellious people when we come to any kind of duty that would cause us to enter into a place of great promise and hope. You see, the duty of our ways is not the duty of God's ways, and if our dutiful ways become disturbed, we simply stiffen our necks, complain of the way, and demand to return to familiar places. Only now, we seem to carry more luggage than before, and in the end the devil of it all seems to prevail.

We have at our fingertips God-ordained instructions in dealing with everyday events, but on the contrary, we choose to listen to the deceiver's influence instead. Subtly, we take an ordinary duty that God gives to us and turn it into an ordinary duty devised by the devil. "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal" (Matthew 6:19-20).

Yes, we are adamant in our hoarding ways of packing tightly within our luggage the things that we know are not only extremely heavy to carry but which also destroy any godly duties to which we might

aspire. If we continue to travel this way for any length of time, we soon notice our inability even to raise our heads up to heaven. Our condition only worsens with our eyes fixed on the things of the earth instead of the things above. But we wouldn't dare think of losing our loads, oh no! Too many days, months, and years have gone into placing those idols tightly upon the luggage rack we bear.

What is so valuable in this luggage that we would so brutally treat ourselves with such contempt? We know our condition only worsens with each passing day, and yet we seem to stay bent on keeping this load secured tightly upon ourselves. We have even noticed much distortion of the rack itself. The load has become so heavy that the effects are vividly being displayed. Yes, those who glance in our direction now witness our great distress. We know that we need to unload at least a portion of this luggage in order to continue the journey, but we cannot bear the thought of exposing what we carry.

If the truth were known, we have had this luggage covered for a long time with a thick, dark covering so that others could not see. Even to us, over time, some of its contents have become irrelevant. But be that as it may, our expressions show outwardly the burdens we bear. Yes, our duty has brought depreciation not only to ourselves, but to those closest to us, too.

The moth to which Jesus refers in the Scripture has worked its way into all the luggage of our lives as well. We also see relationships riddled with holes from these treasures of the past. Our conversations have become lighthearted and double minded, full of vitriolic language, not that others have anything to do with our

condition. But in order to appear strong, we think we need to be loud and even caustic in our conversations. If we can spit, curse, and put others down, then perhaps we will not be so aware of our own pitiful place.

The rust to which Jesus refers is becoming very visible, too. It oozes from beneath, and what we thought was covered so well is now affecting everything with which we come in contact. Deceived, to say the least, over the fact that what we thought would be kept only to ourselves has traveled outwardly into areas where it does a lot of damage. Truly, the decay of this great duty defiles family, friends, church, and community. Yet this luggage we bear upon the rack of our backs seems to be so near and dear to us that we cannot fathom life without it. Truly, the Scripture stands true. "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:21).

Oh, how the subtlety of selfishness has played us like a fiddle! His name is Satan, and spearing our hearts is his favorite thing to do. Deception to bring division on every level is his goal, and if we are willing to any degree, we will become his little puppet. At this point, any sort of relationship is greatly impaired, for even at the onset of conversation, others begin to see our despicable condition.

Friends don't last long when bringing any kind of godly council our way; therefore, we seek ungodly council. But even then, we only base our conversations on comparing the amount and severity of each other's luggage. Yes, we seek those who tell us what we desire to hear and those who desire to listen to our complaints. "For the time will come when men will not put up with sound doctrine. Instead, to suit their own desires, they

will gather around them a great number of teachers to say what their itching ears want to hear. They will turn their ears away from the truth and turn aside to myths" (2 Timothy 4:3-4). Does that description sound familiar? Of course it does, for we are there when we are not with the Lord.

We are subject to either one or the other of two schools of thought: human accomplishment, with our entire luggage upon the racks we bear, or divine achievement, which requires us to cast down our luggage, take up the cross of Christ, and follow Him.

We are either victim or victor, and the decision is ours and ours alone. Is a choice at hand? Yes! Right now, you can choose to keep packing that luggage with you into every relationship that has potential for great possibilities, but that relationship will not prosper due to all your stuff. Or you can cast your baggage down at the feet of Jesus and receive His engrafted Word into your life. "Wherefore lay apart all filthiness and superfluity of naughtiness, and receive with meekness the engrafted word, which is able to save your souls" (James1: 21 KJV).

In this text, the "word" refers to the Lord Jesus Christ, as in the gospel of John 1:1. Jesus is the author of life and the sustainer of life. Without Him, we will ultimately become buried beneath the luggage we bear. With Him, the luggage of the things of this world will come and go, but we will store our treasure in the kingdom of heaven. Will we still have a rack on our back to carry? Of course, only now with Christ all things become new. "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come" (1 Corinthians 5:17).

With Jesus, the rack we bear carries upon it the cross we are called to bear. Only now, instead of heads hung low in despair, we stand erect, ready to crucify the things of the flesh. Each and every day, with a new and willing spirit, we put to death those things that Satan would love to see us once again pick up, tie down, and cover over in order to cause great injury not only to ourselves but to all those with whom we come in contact.

"As it is written: 'For your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered'" (Romans 8:36). Yes, once we have laid our luggage at the feet of Jesus and agreed with His sacrifice for us, we must agree with our sacrificing of carnal passions. Killing them is the duty that will not bring decay, but rather a wholesome life and joy even in the midst of storms.

Do you see a need in your life for such a change? Consider this question. Or perhaps the truths of these writings are only for mere entertainment. Look at the rack that you carry. What's on it? And on a scale from one to ten, how important is it? You alone can decide the answer to that question. But another authority will one day judge your decision.

The luggage from this world will continue to come our way, but whether we tie it upon the rack we bear or cast it to slaughter in the name of Jesus Christ is up to us. May our duties be for God by attending to His sword, which is the Holy Word of God. "And anyone who does not take his cross and follow me is not worthy of me" (Matthew10:38).

What is going to be upon the rack you bear: your accumulated luggage or the cross you are called to

carry? May these words of old be a mighty ring tone for you. "But if serving the LORD seems undesirable to you, then choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your forefathers served beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites, in whose land you are living. But as for me and my household, we will serve the LORD" (Joshua 24:15).

True, many of us have accumulated a lot of luggage from past generations, but for us to accept and apply the disgust of this luggage to our lives now would certainly be foolish. And what will we allow to happen to our children? We must ask, as children from sin-ridden generations: do we not have a responsibility to allow our offspring something more?

"You shall have no other gods before me. You shall not make for yourself an idol in the form of anything in heaven above or on the earth beneath or in the waters below. You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate me, but showing love to a thousand {generations} of those who love me and keep my commandments" (Exodus 20:3-6).

Truly this choice is a no-brainer. Do we want ourselves and our children to fall victim to the sins of our parents? Or shall we send those iniquities to the slaughterhouse, celebrating victory in Jesus Christ and receiving blessings for ourselves and for many generations to come? "I tell you the truth, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven" (Matthew 18:18).

The only way for us to become truly released is through repentance. The responsibility is solely upon each individual to become free from past iniquities entering into the kingdom of heaven or to stay bound to them and experience the great gulf fixed between heaven and hell

The time came when the beggar died and the angels carried him to Abraham's side. The rich man also died and was buried. In hell, where he was in torment, he looked up and saw Abraham far away, with Lazarus by his side. So he called to him, "Father Abraham, have pity on me and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, because I am in agony in this fire."

But Abraham replied, "Son, remember that in your lifetime you received your good things, while Lazarus received bad things, but now he is comforted here and you are in agony. And besides all this, between us and you a great chasm has been fixed, so that those who want to go from here to you cannot, nor can anyone cross over from there to us."

He answered, "Then I beg you, father, send Lazarus to my father's house, for I have five brothers. Let him warn them, so that they will not also come to this place of torment."

Abraham replied, "They have Moses and the Prophets; let them listen to them."

"No, father Abraham," he said, "but if someone from the dead goes to them, they will repent."

He said to him, "If they do not listen to Moses and the Prophets, they will not be convinced even if someone rises from the dead."
